

# **Maquoketa - Destination Iowa Grant**

The City of Maquoketa and Jackson County Conservation were awarded \$750,000 in Destination Iowa funds by Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) for improvements to the Prairie Creek Recreation Area, including a championshipcaliber disc golf course and ADA-accessible hiking trails. Additional enhancements to Prairie Creek will include water quality and recreational improvements for fishing, whitewater viewing, bank protection and tent camping. An open-air shelter for picnicking along with restrooms and grass park setting are part of the plans for the Highway 64 North access point.

This project is designed to boost the footprint of the Prairie Creek Recreation Area into a regional, multi-state destination. Maquoketa Caves State Park serves as the main tourism attraction for the Maquoketa community and visitors are reached on a national scale. The objective is to enhance the Prairie Creek Recreation Area to become known as a supplemental visit for travelers, allowing the State of Iowa and local community partners to capitalize on visitors already coming to Maquoketa Caves.

City officials stated," Maguoketa is in a fine position as a town undergoing a renaissance. Maguoketa's much improved Central Business District, developed in partnership with IEDA, is a suitable location for travelers to visit on a weekend or week in combination with Maquoketa Caves and Prairie Creek Recreation Area."

## **Hopkinton Awarded Derelict Building Grant**

Residents in rural areas often face difficulty accessing health care services due to the scarcity of primary care providers and services. In response, the City of Hopkinton (population 622) in Delaware County has partnered with Regional Medical Center, the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR), and ECIA to relocate and expand an existing regional family health clinic to a new building. The City leveraged \$5,632 in local funds with an ECIA Brownfield Grant and with DNR's Brownfield Grant and Derelict Building Grant programs to clean up the project site for redevelopment.

In its current condition (right), the site has a vacant, abandoned, derelict building creating a blighting influence at a prominent corner of the downtown. Before and after donation of the property, the City of Hopkinton has

Grant and a \$22,225 Derelict Building Grant to deconstruct the building. With deconstruction, building materials will be diverted from the landfill, reused, or recycled to the greatest extent possible. The City's goal is 70% landfill diversion. The cleared site will be transferred to Regional Medical Center, which plans to invest \$800,000 for construction of the new regional family health clinic. This expanded clinic will retain jobs, increase provider coverage to better serve clinic patients, and improve the site's property tax base in Hopkinton. Homeless Program Receives \$1,138,159

### Iowa Finance Authority (IFA) announced the award of more than \$1.1 million

to Community Solutions of Eastern Iowa (CSEI) through its Emergency Rental Assistance Rapid Rehousing (RRH) Project Awards. The award to CSEI will cover the Eastern Iowa Region including Clinton, Delaware, Dubuque, and Jackson counties. CSEI will contract with the YWCA to administer nearly 50% of the funding for RRH in Clinton and Jackson counties. The program will be active for 42 months and will help to provide housing assistance for 12 – 18 months maximum per participant. Eastern Iowa Region Total: \$1,138,159

Jennifer Walker notes, "We are very pleased to have received the ERA funding at this critical time. The City of Dubuque's permanent supportive housing program is ending June 30, 2022, our United Way award and **Emergency Solutions Funding has** decreased significantly, our COVID funding is ending this year, and at the same time, the requests for housing assistance we receive daily are at an all-time high. Higher than when the pandemic began."

Walker adds, "We all agree that something needs to be done, and while we aren't going to end homelessness because the issue is so deep and the causes so wide, we need to do better

3,276 housing and food instability calls. CSEI Special Programs Manager Jennifer calls and believe that our numbers will well-exceed 2021 totals. This money will help fund staff who answer these phone calls, which include County General Assistance calls, and we are very pleased for our community. The ERA RRH funding will help us do that. We estimate that we will be able to help approximately 12 participants (individuals or families) per

month over the course of the three and a half years of the grant. But I want to be clear, this isn't seamless. For people to qualify for the new funding, they have to be homeless by HUD's definitions, so we will not be able to continuously help folks that are currently in programs that are ending. It's a complicated, and sometimes heartbreaking situation, but we are thrilled to know this funding will help reduce our long waiting list." **EICC Receives Federal Grant** 

The U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration (EDA) is awarding a \$787,620 grant to Eastern Iowa Community Colleges (EICC), Davenport, Iowa, to procure equipment needed to support Welding and Computer Numerical Control (CNC) career technologies programs.

This grant will expand and enhance the programs offered at EICC's Regional Career Academy campuses in Clinton and Maquoketa, to train students for in-demand jobs.

The EDA investment will be matched with \$196,905 in local funds. "The Biden Administration is committed to creating new opportunities for workforce development across the country," said Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development Alejandra Y. Castillo. "This EDA investment will provide the equipment needed to expand training programs that regional high school

students and current and potential members of the workforce need to compete for in-demand, skilled workforce positions." This project was made possible by the regional planning efforts led by ECIA.
